

## How does YOUR family celebrate Christmas every year?

Do you look forward to all going to Grandma's house for a big dinner of turkey or ham, and then exchanging presents? Do you decorate a tree and send lots of Christmas cards? Maybe you go to the midnight service at church on Christmas Eve and then enjoy hot chocolate when you get back home? Most of us who have grown up in a Christian home have different family traditions that make Christmas a very special time

of the year. Many Christmas movies show Santa Claus, busy shopping scenes, and carol singers trudging through the snow. But that's because most of these movies are made in Europe or the USA! Christmas in many parts of the world is VERY different!

For Christians who live in the Southern Hemisphere (such as South America or Australia) it comes in the middle of SUMMER! Families often prefer to celebrate at a beach party or an outdoor barbecue! Maybe they decorate palm trees instead of fir trees!

In Argentina evergreen trees are decorated with cotton to look like snow for the summertime celebration, and in Brazil Santa Claus (Papai Noel) wears red silk because of the heat! Every country has its own special Christmas dishes – in Guatemala it's tamales; in Zimbabwe, Africa, it's roast ox; in Hungary it includes fresh wheat sprouts for the special Christmas salad; and in South Korea the children enjoy rice cake soup while dreaming of a visit from "Santa Grandfather"!

There are also many strange Christmas traditions that form part of the celebrations every year. In Caracas, the

capital city of Venezuela, it is customary to rollerskate to a special church service held early in the morning. Before bedtime children tie one end of a piece of string to their big toe and hang the other end of the string out the window! The next morning, rollerskaters give a true to any string than

morning, rollerskaters give a tug to any string they see hanging down! And in the Philippines, there is an even earlier church service called the "Mass of the Rooster" which starts at 4.00 a.m. and is announced by the sound of carols and church bells. Many people take their special star lanterns (called parols) with them as they walk to church in the dark.

In many countries where there are very few Christians or where the ruling government is against Christianity, Christmas day passes just as any other day. It is very hard for Christians who have to go to school or work and can only celebrate in secret.

How would YOU celebrate Christmas if you had to do it in secret, and you couldn't have any decorations or gifts?



What do YOU think is the most important part of the Christmas celebrations? The special food? The presents? Our



traditions? Hopefully we would all say that it is remembering the story of how Jesus was born (you can read this is Matthew 2 and Luke 2), but after that, I think most of us would say that the most important thing is to celebrate it with our family!

There are many, many children around the world who will have to celebrate this Christmas without any gifts or special food – just because they are so poor that their families have nothing extra to make it a special time. Some do not even have a home because they are refugees who had to run away because of a war, or they have to live on the street because they lost their home. There are also millions of children who do not even have a family because their parents died or abandoned them! During this happy, busy Christmas season, let us all take time to remember that there are so many that truly have NOTHING!

But JESUS knows how it feels to be poor and homeless! His mother gave birth to him while she was far from home on a journey, and no-one even invited her into their house to have the baby! She and her husband Joseph could only find a shelter or cave used by



sheep and other animals, to provide a place for their tiny baby to come into the world. Even after Baby Jesus was born, his family had to run away to another country for a couple of years because it was far too dangerous for them to live in their own

country. But God took care of them and Jesus grew up to tell and show everyone about how much our Heavenly Father loves us.

The Christmas Story is truly a wonderful one of love and hope that can bless all who hear it! There are many of our friends around the world who dedicate their lives to sharing the Gospel with children, especially children who are desperately poor

or have no family. We have been able to send packages of balloons, stickers and other small gifts as well as some donations, so that they can hold special events to bless children this Christmas time. Please pray for them and if you also want to help, get in
